The University of NC School of the Arts Hosts Music For Food Concert Series

Concerned about the numbers of food insecure people in our community, UNCSA faculty member and world-renowned violinist Ida Bieler are bringing Music for Food to Winston-Salem to help address this need. *Music for* Food is a musician-lead initiative that began in Boston by violist Kim Kashkashian to help fight hunger in local communities. Based in the belief that music and food are essential for human life to flourish, this program relies on musician volunteers to create musical experiences in exchange for audience donations to hungerrelief agencies.

Motivated by social activism through classical music, many musicians have participated in the *Music for Food* concert series spanning 18 cities across the nation. Ida Bieler and her performing colleagues believe that artists must be strong social advocates and active community members, now more than ever, since the pandemic has drastically increased the number of families who face hunger in their homes.

The UNCSA School of Music is pleased to partner with Crisis Control Ministry, Temple Emanuel, and SECCA in presenting two

concerts featuring faculty and students with all proceeds going to Crisis Control Ministry's food pantries. The concerts will feature the UNCSA faculty ensemble, the Reynolda Quartet and student ensembles. The Temple Emmanuel concert will take place on March 30 at 7:00 PM and include the performance of Brahms' String Quartet Op. 51 No.1 in C minor. The SECCA concert will happen on May 1 at 2:00 PM and feature Beethoven's String Quartet Op. 16 No. 6 and Bartók's String Quartet No.6 in D minor, Sz.114. Neighbors Helping Neighbors

Little Ones Can Do Big Things

During the month of February, the Kernersville food pantry was blessed by the hard work of the youth in our community by who did big things to help those in need.

Lexie Olive may be small, but her heart is huge. For several years now, this industrious young lady has organized her own food drive for the Kernersville Crisis Control Ministry Food Pantry. She likes to do this project during the month of February to celebrate Valentine's Day. She calls her food drive "Share the Love."

She plans out where she is going to place collection boxes and even makes a list of items that are most needed and shares that information with donors. Then, with some support from Ameriprise Financial, who creates a matching fund, she raises money for CCM so we can purchase items needed to fill our pantry. She really thinks of everything! This year her work really paid off! She collected 562 pounds of much-needed food and personal care items, and \$2,640 in cash donations! Thank you Lexie for sharing your love for helping others!

In February, the Kernersville Scouts made an impact in their community with their annual food drive, "Scouting for Food." This year's collection surpassed previous years' bounty by several hundred pounds. Participating were packs and troops

from Sedge Garden UMC, Main Street UMC, Kernersville Moravian Church and Pisgah UMC. Local scouting groups in our area are supported by the Old Hickory Council.

The collection of non-perishable food items delivered to the Kernersville Crisis Control Ministry office weighed in at 4,934 pounds; that's almost 5,000 pounds of much-needed supplies received on Saturday, February 12th, and Monday, February 14th. The retail value of all that food would exceed \$13,000. A big thank you to these scouts! The food collected will keep the pantry well stocked for approximately one month.

In January of this year, the Kernersville food pantry was able to provide 4,743 pounds of food to local families because of annual and monthly food drives like these. In the fiscal year 2021, the Kernersville food pantry distributed over \$88,000 worth of aroceries to families in crisis. This would not have been possible without the generous donations from our local supporters. They are helping their neighbors receive nutritious food year-round!

CCM Assists Elderly Couple in Keeping Their Home Warm

Recently, we received a call from a concerned daughter. Her parents, in their 70s, had just filled their fuel oil tank for the second time in a month only to discover that there was a hole in the tank and all the oil had leaked into the around. They contacted their property owner who agreed to fix the problem, but in the meantime, had to use space heaters to heat their home. We could see that their energy use had doubled during the month of January, presumably due to the strain from those space heaters. The clients, who are on a fixed income of social security, now had an astronomical power bill and no funds leftover after having bought oil twice in one month. On top of this, the elderly couple was also facing a



garnishment of their income and a \$40/month rent increase. The confluence of these events made it impossible for them to pay the large power bill. Thankfully, CCM was able to assist with \$508. We verified that the property owner replaced the oil heat with an HVAC system and hope that they will experience more affordable energy costs going forward.
